to meeting the needs of various charities.

Many helpful hands went into making the annual yard and bake sale a success. The \$1714.00 raised will go to four local charities: EPIC, Merci Clinic, Boy's Transition Home, and Coastal Women's Shelter. As tradition, these gifts will be presented at our Christmas luncheon on Dec. 8 at the Chelsea Restaurant. One need not be in the Woman's Fellowship to attend the luncheon as <u>all</u> are welcome. Reservation forms will be in the church bulletin as time gets closer. This is always a time of sharing the joys of the season.

At the Oct. 19th meeting, the BWF will be assembling 100 plus fishing kits for Samaritan's Purse Operation Shoe Box program. These fishing kits will be added to the shoeboxes that the Port City Community Church in New Bern are assembling.

FINANCE-PATTI MASON

Did you know that we have a Finance Committee? Well, we do and if you want to be on it, please let us know. The Finance Committee consists of a chairperson, the treasurer, the finance secretary, the members of each major committee in the church, and at-large members upon request. A request for pledges is sent out each year around the month of August. The importance of pledges is it enables us to project income for the following year. only the Finance Chairperson/Financial Secretary knows who has pledged. The Finance Secretary never tells the Finance Chairperson the amount people have given to date – the only time the Finance Chair knows is if you ask for an official tax receipt for use on your taxes.

It is the policy of this church that your gift to God, entrusted through the church, is between you and God. Our church has no position in that relationship. This is documented in the Financial Policy along with all other policies, procedures, and instructions. The Budget and Financial Policy are available upon request. This committee also is responsible for the counting of the gifts each week. Several teams have been formed to count money and if you are interested in assisting that would be great – help is always needed in this duty. The Financial Secretary is responsible for the bookkeeping associated with the weekly gifts and for deposits into the appropriate banking account. The Treasurer is responsible for keeping the money in the various sub-accounts and creating a quarterly Profit and Loss statement that is presented at the Administrative Council Meetings.

The finance Committee presented a recommended budget to the Administrative Council for approval, which was approved. The budget projected is \$103,232 in income and \$114,400 in expenses. Yes, that means there are more projected expenses than income; however, historically our records show that this gap will be closed by good stewardship by the various each budget line assigned steward.

Thanks to the fantastic stewardship of our predecessors, our church was able to afford disaffiliation from the UMC with relatively low impact. A summary of the costs is:

Remaining 2023 Apportionments - \$3728.25

Prepayment of the 2024 Apportionments - \$10,182

Pension Fund Payment - \$9,890

Incorporation Legal Fees - \$1,584

Quick Deed Legal Fees - \$2,025

Changes to the church - \$216

Signage changes – donated

Modification of books – donated

For a grand total of \$27,627.

The church's bottom line is in good shape. Be on the lookout for some fundraisers in the future to add this money back into the bank – each fundraiser will be for a specific budget line! The Budget and Financial Policy are available upon request. Tax receipts are available upon request. The Treasurer's quarterly Profit/Loss statement is available upon request. Our daily attendance average is 36.

THERE'S JUST ONE MORE THING

"Oh, there's just one more thing..." There are few things more frustrating than thinking that everything is understood and then there is an addition to the instructions. In the book of Colossians, Paul is addressing a people who have been told, "you have Christ and that's great...oh yeah, but there's one more thing you need...." What Paul writes to them is that if they have Jesus, they have it all they need to be fully assured in the faith! They don't need anything else except to cling to Jesus. Note Colossians 2:6-10 and what he says about our assurance:

We Have Received Christ Jesus (v. 6). We are Christians. We have received "the seed which is the word of God" (Mark 4:14-ff). We have obeyed the gospel. We can rest in the fact that receiving the grace of God by an obedient faith makes us His children (Rom. 6:17-18).

We Are Rooted in Christ Jesus (v. 7). How deep our roots are has a direct correlation to our time spent in the word learning Jesus (cf. Psalm 1:1-3; Jn. 8:31-32; 15:1-5). If we have our roots in Him, then we are able to be built up in Him.

We Are Built Up in Christ Jesus (v. 7). A seed that is planted begins growing downward in its roots, and then begins to grow upward. If we have never allowed ourselves to be built up in Christ Jesus, it could very well be that we have not payed attention to our "Roots" like we ought. Thus, we allow someone or something other than Jesus to try to tell us how to grow.

We are Complete in Christ Jesus (v.10). A plant is not fully mature until it is producing fruit. We are complete in Him and His word. God has given us "all things that pertain to life and godliness through the knowledge of Him who called us by glory and virtue..." (II Pet. 1:3). There is nothing else we need to bear fruit for the Master than what is established in Christ.

Jesus establishes our faith, grows our faith, and finishes our faith. When challenges arise threatening our faith in Christ, we may say, "He is all I need." We received Him, we are rooted in Him, we are being built up in Him, and we are complete in Him. That's the only thing that matters!

The Glory of the Unlikely—author unknown

Perhaps the great glory of Christmas is that in the birth of His only Begotten, the Lord revealed to us that He is the God of the "unlikely"...

For how unlikely is it that the King of the universe should be born in a stable normally reserved for animals which children's tales tell us were the only witnesses to His arrival. How unlikely that nation which had so long awaited her Messiah should completely miss the fulfillment of her dreams and reject her only salvation. How unlikely that this Messiah should live the great majority of His life in obscurity without the pomp and circumstance befitting Royalty, and indeed without "form or comeliness that we should desire Him". And perhaps most of all, how unlikely that such a One should die in shame and degradation, apparently discarded upon the trash heap of history, a just another well-intentioned zealot without the means to accomplish His desired end.

This is the glory of Christmas, a glory which fills the present as well as the past. For how unlikely that the humiliated is now the Glorified and the possessor of that Name at which one day all will bow. How unlikely that the Satan who apparently destroyed Him was and is the unwitting servant of the God who "works ALL things after the counsel of His own will". How unlikely indeed that tragedy should eternally breed triumph in the purposes of that One in whom all wisdom resides. And perhaps most of all, how incredibly unlikely that Wisdom Herself should deign to fill the seemingly marred, broken and useless vessels that we appear to be that He might live His perfect, complete and loving life in and as us. How unlikely and how unspeakably wonderful that in our weakness, His strength is made perfect and that He actually NEEDS us to be AS WE ARE that the glory of His Person alone might be revealed by us.

He is the God of the unlikely, the God who requires stables in which to birth His Beloved rather than the pristine palaces we might anticipate. So let us expect to find Him there, in the stables of our lives and worlds- the circumstances, situations and people where we least expect Him to be. Indeed let us see that the glory of His presence is most often in direct proportion to the appearance of His absence, and let us rejoice that Christmas above all proclaims that we have found the King of the universe in the most unlikely place of all...

The Trustees will be reorganizing this fall. We will hold a meeting to establish a Trustee committee for the next three years. The Global Methodist Church (GMC) only requires us to have 5 trustees so I will propose we reduce the size of our trustee committee. Also, the GMC doesn't allow trustees to serve more than six years in a row. If we include the time served prior to disaffiliation most if the current trustees will be timed out or will soon time out. I will announce the Trustees meeting sometime in the next couple weeks.
